Year 1 of the BC Speed Skating Academy is well underway, with a pilot location at the Richmond Olympic Oval and Academy Outreach Tour sessions occurring in select locations around the province. The BC Speed Skating Association (BCSSA) Board of Directors and staff have applied for new funding to continue to support, and expand, the Academy for Year 2 (2016-2017) and are awaiting final confirmation of receipt of funds.

Mission

To provide in-province programming, supplemental to existing club programming, consistent with Stage 1 on the Elite Athlete Pathway*.

Vision

Developing T2T and L2C-aged BCSSA club skaters will train and race regularly in quality environments within BC. The Academy training/racing environments will supplement existing club programming to strive towards meeting Stage 1 requirements for BCSSA skaters.

Values

- Quality (training/racing environments)
- Accessibility (geographical and financial)
- Accountability (financial)
- Development (of human and equipment resources)

Outcome Goals

- By 2018-2019 season, a minimum of 10% of competitors at national competitions will be BCSSA skaters.
- Increase the flag points earned by TEAM BC Speed Skating at the 2019 Canada Winter Games (as compared to the 2015 Canada Winter Games).

2015/2016 Season (Year 1 of Academy)------

Season Goals

- 1. The Academy pilot will run at the Richmond Olympic Oval with participating skaters from a majority of the nine Lower Mainland clubs.
- 2. There will be a contracted Coach and designated Strength & Conditioning services in place at the pilot location.
- 3. Academy Outreach Tour sessions will run in a minimum of three locations around the province.

2016/2017 Season (Year 2 of Academy)------

Season Goals

- 1. There will be four established and functioning Academy locations in BC.
- 2. There will be a contracted coach, equipment specialist and designated strength & conditioning services in place at each location.
- 3. There will be a sport therapy, sport psychology and sport nutrition professional available provincially on a consultative basis to the Academy Team.
- 4. Full-time Academy skaters at each location will be exposed to a minimum of 35 face-to-face programming hours and ~5 additional hours via webinar.
